# **Our Minister**

## Having Faith in Faith



To live by faith is not the same as living in certainty. It is logically impossible to be certain about faith. In that sense having faith in God is different to being certain about God. Faith gives us access to the holy and transcendent in ways certainty cannot. Easter is a prime example. It marks the time of year when the Church celebrates the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, a feast day that simultaneously calls forth an act of faith and at the same time affirms that act of faith. For centuries Christians have confessed the Apostle's Creed, which begins with the words, *"I believe…"* not with, *"I am certain …"*. Christians have never been certain. There is too much at stake for that.

Most of the 18th-century philosophers who led the Enlightenment weren't particularly interested in getting rid of religion. They just wanted us to call it faith.

It was an unintentional gift to the Church, because it sought to keep the categories of certainty and faith separate. Our desire for certainty is very understandable especially today when it feels like politically, socially and economically the ground is shifting beneath our feet. We're desperately looking to be certain about something.

And our relationship with God is no different. But the easiest way to destroy someone's love for us is to continually ask them to prove it. All healthy relationships are bound together by faith. All weddings are an act of faith. Our marriages and our friendships are all based on the belief that when a crisis happens, we all hope and believe that family and friends will rush to the emergency room.

It wasn't necessary or certain that God would love us despite our sins, or indeed forgive us. The decision to give those blessings was God's choice. As for faith, that's just our way of accessing those blessings.

Thankfully, for reasons only He knows, God keep choosing to have faith in our faith. Happy Easter to you and yours.

## **Meteorological Miscellanea**

How fickle the weather can be, especially in March. The transition from winter to spring can be early or it can be late. This year we have been flirting with attainable records. Four days before submitting this report I had decided to lead with the dryness of the month and then, in one night, the running rainfall total doubled. I had read that there was a high risk of wildfires across Scotland. There is still a chance of my driest March on record. March 1996 saw just 1.02 inches (26mm). So far, we stand at 0.94 inches. Close!

We came close with the first '60F' of the year on the 21st. The earliest was 19th March in 2005. It has been as late as 9th May in 1998. Kinlochewe read 19C (66.2F). The 22nd followed with 61F, so summer not far away? Well, the maximum temperature on the 23rd was just 45.5F with a cold NE'ly. The North Sea haar never lifted!

There have been wintry elements with 7 overnight frosts. On 3 of those nights the mercury read 25F (-3.9C). There was an 8 am flurry of snow on the 12th and overnight snow on the 14th turned the Pentlands white - just once more? Well, snow in May is not unknown.

The most uplifting aspect of this month has been the sunshine. Just 2 sunless days so far. There were 8 such days in February. We've had 6 'wall to wall' sunny days and out of the wind the warmth of the sun can be enjoyed. At the end of the week the clocks go forward. Hurray! And the daffodils are coming out!

## Malawi update

Since last month we have had our contact Robert Chibisa and family join us online for a summary how life is for them and how the project is going. Robert is a Project Facilitator for Development Aid from People to People (DAPP) Malawi. The project was funded by USAID but this funding was paused in January and Robert was told to take unpaid leave.

The project aims to support the building of a Community Development Centre in Makwangwala, Ntcheu District. The main purpose is to promote early childhood development. It will be used as a preschool and vaccination centre for children and to facilitate education around parenting. The main building is almost complete, and Robert's next task is to build a cooking shelter and toilets. Once these are in place the building can open.



Our fundraising continues with  $\pounds 139$  donated at our latest Friday night talk. Huge thanks to The Guild who are donating a very generous  $\pounds 500!$ 

So far £1,418 has been raised for the project and £1,311 has been raised to support Robert.

The before and after photographs were inspiring and Rona explained how she selected what should grow where and how the plants that prove themselves make it into the sales area.

If you've visited Quercus, you will be able to picture the willow walk and the little bridge over the stream, the herbs planted in a checkerboard pattern and the model railway by the borders on the top tier. The transformation is remarkable and it's obvious that a lot of hard work goes in to keeping everything looking ship-shape.

It's a great place to visit for ideas and to pick up some hardy, locally grown plants.

There was plenty of time for questions after the talk and some gardening problems were undoubtedly solved!



Good Friday, the Friday before Easter, is a bit of a misnomer given the event it remembers but it's safe to say that these days Fridays have taken on a mostly positive role. "That Friday Feeling" is a phrase in common usage now, so why are Fridays so 'Good'.

Those of you who are retired may have forgotten the euphoria that sweeps over the worker at clocking-off time on a Friday afternoon. For some of you who are still gainfully employed you may notice that a hush falls over your inbox after Friday lunch time – things are winding down.

What are we feeling in these moments? Is it a 'Christmas Eve' type of anticipation for what's to come? Time with family we've only seen in passing during the week, time to relax, or read, potter, play sports, have long walks with the dog and see friends. On Fridays the weekend is brimming with possibilities. A couple of days like this and we're ready to go back to the coal face.
