JUNE 2021

I imagine few among us do not have a mobile phone. As one who, for a long time, vowed I would never possess one, I now seldom go anywhere without what has become the must-have item of personal technology. In view of my initial resistance I am a little reluctant to admit that, but it is true.

Not only do our mobiles enable easy and instant communication, for me it is my timepiece, my handy pocket camera and a source of seemingly endless amounts of information on any number of subjects. Among its many other functions, it incorporates a calculator, it monitors my daily exercise, it provides a readily accessible photo album and in recent times has carried applications that aid with tracking and tracing in the Covid pandemic.

In the light of all of this, it is little wonder that the phone's storage capacity was coming alarming close to its limit. Very helpfully, though I had not known it, the phone gives me a breakdown and to my horror I discovered that the greatest drain on storage capacity came from the 'recycle bin'.

For years I have tried systematically to delete various items that I have felt no further need of, specifically in order to save the battery. Had I been more tech-savvy I might have realised that pressing 'delete' would not remove items from the phone altogether, but would only send them elsewhere, namely the recycle bin. When I discovered this and emptied the bin, suddenly I had oodles of spare capacity. What a wonderful discovery!

The General Assembly that came to a close last Thursday has spent much time reflecting on reports and engaging in debates focusing on the multi-faceted crisis that is confronting the Church. The strain on finances and the acute shortage of ministers are but two continuing manifestations of the overall challenges we face, but money and personnel apart, one fundamental question, to be addressed at every level, concerns priorities.

We need to set our priorities for mission: where, in the lives of our parishes and communities, should we be concentrating our efforts? How can we make optimum use of our human and other resources to be worshipping and serving communities that proclaim, in word and action, our love of and service to Jesus Christ? How can we hold in tension those aspects of being Church that we feel we cannot do without, together with the absolute necessity of discarding those structures, traditions and practices that may have served us well but which we can afford to carry no longer. We need to be mindful that, as John Henry Newman put it, the Church exists primarily for those who are not part of it.

As we look to the future and to a new ministry in our extended linking, there will, of necessity, be certain changes of emphases in how we organise ourselves. More will be asked of elders, members and adherents. Gifts and talents will be discerned and put to work effectively in the service of Christ. As we reach out to our communities, we shall have to be increasingly ready to acknowledge that those who become part of our congregations cannot be expected simply to fit in with the way we do things. To follow Newman's line, the Church exists to serve and glorify Christ and not to please its members.

We are in the midst of challenging but exciting times for all of us and, like every living entity, we live with constant change. Sometimes that can be unsettling, at other times exhilarating, but either way we need to cast off what is no longer essential so that our collective power pack, in which our shared faith is the most important element, will be primed for the purpose.

Rhubarb and Almond Crumble Tart

1 x 23cm. shortcrust pastry case – cooked				
750g. rhubarb, chopped	140g. golden caster sugar	juice of 1 large orange		
Topping:-				
140g. butter	100g. ground almonds	140g. plain flour		
175g. light muscovado sugar	¹ / ₄ teaspn ground cinnamon	handful flaked almonds		

Method:-

Oven 180C / gas 4

Cook rhubarb with orange juice and caster sugar until just tender, but still holding its shape. Tip into a sieve over a bowl and reserve the syrup.

Rub together the topping ingredients, except the almonds.

Spoon rhubarb into baked pastry case, then crumble over the topping. Scatter with almonds and bake for approx. 20 mins.
