'What is a Procrustean Bed?'

"The bed is too short...and... the blanket is too narrow." (Isaiah 28:20)

Among the myths of Greek antiquity, is the story of Procrustes. He was a notorious legendary highwayman of Attica, who tied his victims on an iron bed, and, as the case required, either stretched or cut off their legs to adapt them to its length. Hence, the phrase a "*Procrustean bed*" came to refer to an idea, theory, or system to which facts could and would be arbitrarily fitted to fit the desired outcome. Rather like the pontifications of some of our contemporary political leaders.

Isaiah is not the only Old Testament prophet to use the analogy of a bed to illustrate the dangers of an inadequate faith. His contemporary Amos speaks in his prophecies of, "Those who sit in Samaria on the edge of their beds and on the corner of their couches."

We all know people who tend to perch precariously on the edges of beds and the corners of couches. As though they are afraid to commit themselves to the extent of sitting firmly or fully on the bed or couch. It's the "I can only stay for a moment!" attitude; reflective of an apparent unwillingness to become "Too involved." It is seen in a body posture that says, "Let me just rest ever so lightly on the edge, not get too settled, for fear I might want to beat a hasty retreat." Some people go through their whole life with that attitude: minimum faith, minimum involvement, and minimum concern for others.

Isaiah's graphic and humorous picture of a bed with skimpy covering is addressed to a people who although feverish in their religious activities suddenly discovering the all too obvious inadequacy of their religion to cover the facts and to meet the needs for life in a time of real crisis.

It begs the question, is it ever appropriate to reduce our religious convictions to a minimum, to boil them down to a few ethical principles? Surely reduction can never be the last word on the Christian faith. When we speak of music, we don't ask how much we can get rid of and still have it be counted musical.

When we speak of the family, we never dream of considering what parental duties we can evade and still be considered a good parent. Is it not the same with faith? How little of the Christian faith can we do without and still think we have a Christian faith? Is it true of us, as one wit put it, that "Many professing Christians have found just enough faith to cherish their own opinion."

What Isaiah is trying to say to his devoutly religious audience is that the person who tries to reduce their faith in God to mere religious duty and decency will in the crises of life find that the 'bed is too short and the blanket too narrow.' Religious activity whatever its guise comes easily, naturally, and often cheaply to human beings. But according to Jesus, the Gospel, he calls us to believe in and commit to will cost us nothing, except everything we are and own.

This is the supplied pattern for Class 25 of the industrial section, Peebles Agricultural Show.

Blankets will be donated to charity.

Knitted Blanket -Basket Weave

With 4mm needles (UK size 8) cast on 140 sts.

Rows 1-10 Knit

Rows 11-20 knit 10 *Knit 10, purl 10* repeat * to* until last 10 sts, knit 10

Rows 21 – 30 knit 10 *purl 10, knitl 10* repeat * to* until last 10 sts, knit 10

Continue with this pattern until blanket measures approx 24"

Knit final 10 rows, cast off.

This is the supplied recipe for Class 5 of the industrial section.

Vegan Courgette Cake Recipe

Ingredients

80g vegan butter block, softened, plus extra for the tin 175g golden caster sugar
2 lemons, zested, 1 juiced
100ml plant milk (we used oat)
100g ground almonds
175g self-raising flour
½ tsp baking powder
175g courgettes, coarsely grated
For the icing 200g icing sugar

Method

STEP 1

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Butter and line 2 x 450g loaf tins. Beat together the vegan butter block, sugar and lemon zest until combined. Add the plant milk and beat slowly to combine. Add the ground almonds, flour and baking powder, along with the grated courgette, and stir to combine. Spoon the batter into the prepared tin (it will be quite thick) and level the top. Bake each cake for 40-45 mins until a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean. Transfer to a wire rack and leave to cool completely in the tin.

STEP 2

To make the icing, sieve the icing sugar into a bowl and add 1 tbsp of the lemon juice and stir to combine. Add a little more lemon juice if needed, ½ tsp at a time, until you reach your desired consistency. Remove the cake from the tin and drizzle over the icing, allowing it to drip down the sides. Leave to set for 20-30 mins. Cut into slices to serve.

Garden Ramblings

Every year at this time I can't help singing the Nana Mouskouri song "Till the white rose blooms again" as my favourite white rose "Rosa Alba Maxima" (which has a claim to fame being the rose on the bonnets of Bonnie Prince Charlie's supporters) never fails to be covered in sweetly scented semi double white flowers. This is a show stopper with dozens of blooms, trouble free. With a height of 6 ft this is a large shrub but takes well to pruning if need be. Mine has been in the garden for years here at Lamancha. I use comfrey as ground cover under it so I suppose it gets fed from that as I never use any other fertilizer.

Hasn't this been a glorious few weeks of dry weather? I have been doing my bit saving water by washing the dishes in a basin and letting the water cool and then using it to water the clematis. I've never seen so many flowers on clematis tangutica.

The gooseberries are due to be picked so are on the list of "to do" next. I did have some redcurrants but our resident wood pigeon beat me to it at 9 o'clock last night. I could only laugh as she was so clumsy hurling herself at the bush to dislodge them!

I have sown some white foxglove seeds plus some hollyhocks and there are more lupins on the go too so already looking ahead to next year.

Have a lovely summer in your gardens and just ignore the weeds!
