#### 'Against Christianity.' (March 24)

There is no doubt that Christianity has indelibly marked Western civilisation. And yet the New Testament never mentions Christianity. It does not contain the concept of Christianity. It does not preach Christianity. It does not encourage Christians to preach Christianity. Neither Jesus nor his apostles preached Christianity. During those early centuries when the Church was in her vibrant infancy, she did not preach Christianity. Why not? Perhaps because to preach Christianity is to preach ourselves and Jesus did not encourage us to preach ourselves.

The emphasis of the New Testament Gospel message does not lie in its advocacy of a set of doctrines, much less a specific moral and ethical code called Christianity. The New Testament is not an ideological tract it does not teach an ideology. Yes, it does present a certain view of the world and of reality. A view that has propositional content. But it is a fatal error to think that it was ever intended to be systemised with the end result being a "worldview" called Christianity. Rather the New Testament is chiefly concerned with the uniqueness of a specific person, Jesus of Nazareth.

Also contrary to popular belief the New Testament does not urge us to embrace 'religion.' In fact, some of the best-known books in the New Testament are concerned with battling the toxic nature of 'getting religion' and its subsequent religiousity. That is why the New Testament does not represent new Christians as people who 'got religion.' In fact, all of the early converts to the Gospel were already deeply religious people before they ever became followers of Jesus. All of Jesus' apostles were very devout Jews, in the stories in the Book of Acts, the Roman centurion, Cornelius, and the Ethiopian Eunuch were deeply religious people before ever becoming followers of Jesus. The new Gentile converts who filled the New Testament churches were in their previous life very devout idol worshippers. None of these people 'got religion' when they became followers of Jesus, they already had religion but the religion they had wasn't working.

As human being we are always desiring one thing over another, aiming for one thing instead of another, thinking one way over another. It is not that *the stuff* inside of us is unformed but rather it is badly aimed and wrongly formed and therefore, needs to be transformed. To put it in computer terminology becoming a Christian is not a case of having our 'religious programming' updated to the latest 'Christianity version'. Actually, it is more like having a whole new operating system.

In a late-night conversation in John's Gospel Jesus describes becoming a Christian as akin to rebirthing. Not unlike our first birth it is something we are involved in but for the most part it is something that happens to us. According to Jesus a person who becomes one of his followers is not someone who has adopted a certain moral and ethical code. Rather, they are a human being who has become 'human again' but in a rather unique way.

Why not take time this week to read chapter 3 of John's Gospel, and think about the story, the characters, and the conversation.



#### Baby Brunch - Ten years old in May

As many of you may know, Baby Brunch meets in the Old Church Hall on Friday mornings during school term time.

On 31<sup>st</sup> May this year it will be 10 years since our first ever Baby Brunch session. The aim from the start was to provide a warm and welcoming place for parents and carers with babies and young toddlers to come and socialise with others. We were supported by a grant from the Church of Scotland "Go For It Fund" to get started.

I don't know how many families we have known in that time, but I can report that in the course of 2023, 39 families came to Baby Brunch for at least part of the year. This included familiar faces from the previous year, return of families with a new little one, and well as many new faces.

We started out as a band of 4/5 volunteers, some of whom attended every week. We now have 12 volunteers and 2 more about to join us, we have a rota with 3 for the full morning and a 4<sup>th</sup> coming in to help over the busy time. Those of us who have been involved from the start, (and are now 10 years older), are delighted to have so much help! Most of our volunteers have joined us through word of mouth and just seem to appear when we have been in need! We are hugely grateful to them all for their time and commitment.

The role of volunteers is to do the "housekeeping" for the group but it is also about chatting to parents/ carers, introducing newcomers to others, holding a baby to allow the adult to get a coffee/ attend to a sibling, (or just to have baby cuddles!!)

From the start Baby Brunch was known for home baking and good coffee, and in recent years we have had a group of volunteer scone makers, who bake for Baby Brunch on a rota basis. Their contribution is very much appreciated. The scones are intended for adults with a choice of "snacks" for the children. I think sometimes adults end up sharing their scone with their child!

While the majority of those who come are from within our Linkage area, over the years we have had families from Lasswade/Peebles/Penicuik. Usually on a recommendation of a local user with whom they are friends.

Yes, Friday mornings can be hectic and we go home to sit quietly and put our feet up, but the reward of receiving such warm and positive feedback from those who have attended the Group makes it all worthwhile!

Seeing children around the village "all grown up" and still chatting who families to speak of their warm memories of Baby Brunch, and the support it provided, is an added bonus as well.





#### MESSY CHURCH
