Finding Prophets among the Paperbacks

If you are wanting something to read this summer do yourself a favour and read Lionel Shriver's latest novel *Mania*. Shriver sets her story in an alternative 21st century. The main character, Pearson Converse, is wrestling with the 'latest' major political dogma of her time. And in doing so, she's in danger of losing her best friend; ends up having tense arguments with her husband; is summoned to the dean's office at the University where she teaches; and receives a threatening visit from Child Protection Services. The plot of the story is focused on the last crusade for social justice which isn't racism, or gender equity but "*cognitive discrimination*."

The Mental Parity (MP) movement inspired by the best-selling *The Calumny of IQ: Why Discrimination Against "Dum People" is the Last Great Civil Rights Fight,* has begun its blitzkrieg through educational institutions. It's no longer permissible to speak about, or even to acknowledge, differences of intelligence. "Smart," "stupid," "dumb," and all similar evaluative terms are placed on the MP Index of forbidden words. The Child Protection Services visit Pearson's home because her youngest child, Lucy, reports to a teacher that her mother uses these insulting words at home.

Smart books and smart movies are censored, because they assume cognitive disparities and make some people feel inferior. Dumb movies— *Dumb and Dumber*, for instance—are preceded by a "warning about offensive representations of cognitive inferiority." *The Simpsons* gets cancelled because of the double transgression of portraying an idiot (Homer) and a genius (Lisa).

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In a society where intelligence gets flattened, everything else does too. No one can admit there's such a thing as "being good at." Pearson's daughter Zanzibar is too good an actor to be cast in school plays, and the orchestra director stops her when she plays a stunning Bach melody on her flute. Pearson's tree-surgeon husband, Wade, tries to keep his head down, hoping MP will never touch him, until he's forced to hire an incompetent employee and keep him on the payroll for fear of a cognitive discrimination lawsuit, a decision that leads to disaster. With the American food system and auto industry staffed with dumb people who aren't allowed to be trained, American food becomes toxic and American cars explode on the highway.

Sudoku, crosswords, and all other puzzle games are quietly dropped from newspapers because of how they make the '*cognitively different*' feel inadequate. Pearson's teaching is hamstrung because telling students something they don't know already comes with the forbidden implication that they were ignorant before they learned it. Schools have given up on testing and grading.

Mania is a great piece of satire that pokes fun at contemporary not unlike our own society and of where that society might be headed. It all makes for an interesting and compelling read. In one remarkable passage Shriver lets her characters reflect on the energies of radicalism:

> 'Radical movements keep ratcheting up their demands because nothing enervates a cause more than success. Crusaders resent having their purpose stolen out from under them by the fulfilment of their quest; reaching the promised land leaves seekers bereft. There's little to do in a utopian oasis but sip coconut water. So, the journey must never be completed. The goal must remain out of reach. To preserve the perfect impossibility of getting there, the desired end point becomes ever more extreme.'

Shriver's humorous tale makes a serious point, like all good authors she may prove to be less of a satirist and more of a prophet.

Kirk Session Report

A Kirk Session meeting was held on Tuesday 25th June 2024.

It was a very full agenda, but the summary is:

Steven Whalley has been appointed as co-Session Clerk and will work closely with Kevin.

Dr Foley outlined the thinking of an event for all the linkage congregations to be held in September/October. More details will follow.

Ann Lyon summarised the great things that have been happening in Sunday Club, including the Easter Egg hunt, and the bunting that was made during the Whipman service which was shown to those who attended as they had coffee after the service. The Club now has 15 members,

A property report including confirmation that the work on the outside of the Church had been completed and that there was new flooring in the New Church Hall and in the Church vestry.

Michael Knott presented the accounts, which had previously been reviewed and approved by the independent examiner, Jean Macnab, and he answered questions arising. It was noted that a shortfall of £5,000 had arisen over the year, and also that the costs of the external work on the Church roof and walls during the period from October 2023 would fall to be met in the 2024 financial year. It was therefore anticipated that the 2024 accounts would also be likely to show a shortfall. The Kirk Session approved the accounts, which would then be presented to the congregation at the Stated Annual Meeting.'

There was an update on the newsletter following the exercise to reduce printing cost by distributing via e-mail. There are 85 names on the e-mail distribution list.

There was an update on safeguarding including a reminder of the training that needs to be undertaken.

There was an update on Boys Brigade and the Kirk Session expressed it's thanks to Emma Lyon for taking on a leadership role.

There was a summary of monies paid out since the last Kirk Session by the Kenneth Paul Trust.

There was a discussion on reporting and other activity needed to be undertaken on the Manse. Michael Knott agreed to take on the manse convener position on a temporary basis and would progress the manse condition schedule which is now due.

Report on St Andrew's Stated Annual Meeting

The Stated Annual meeting was held after the service on Sunday (30th June).

Dr Foley welcomed everyone and confirmed Steven Whalley had been appointed co-Session Clerk and that he will work closely with Kevin Scott.

Michael Knott presented the congregational accounts for 2023 - a separate report on this is included elsewhere in this newsletter - and thanks were expressed to Mrs Jean Macnab for acting as independent examiner of the accounts

Steven Whalley, on behalf of the Property Committee, described all the work on property including the work on the outside of the Church.

Ann Lyon reported on Sunday Club, which is now 2 years old, and thanked the Congregation for their welcoming and supportive approach.

Kevin Scott then gave a comprehensive report on all the Church activities with the theme that we do new things as part of God's work. He thanked the many people involved in God's work in the Church, especially the new team of leaders at Boys Brigade and he also celebrated the 10 years of Baby Brunch. He highlighted importance of the choir to our Church life and worship and thanked those organists who play for us each Sunday. Kevin closed by reflecting on the Whipman Service this year, held in the marquee on the Lower Green, noting the profound and powerful message which had been made to our community that we were happy to move outwith our four walls and to share our faith with them in their place of community in the Whipman Marquee.

Dr Foley closed the meeting leading us in prayer.

Finance Report for 2023

The congregational accounts for 2023 were presented at the Stated Annual Meeting.

There was a shortfall for the year of just over £5,000. Overall income was up by around 5% after adjusting for two exceptional items in the previous year, these being the grant received for purchase and installation of the cameras in the Church and the recovery of manse rent from 121. Income from offerings and Gift Aid recovery was steady, with an increase in receipts from both bank interest and hall rental payments.

Expenses were at a similar level to 2022, after adjusting for the exceptional item for purchase of the camera equipment following receipt of the grant payment. Key expense items in 2023 were for St Andrew's contribution to the cost of ministry and for property repair and maintenance. The latter again reflects an element of catching up on necessary work which had been delayed during lockdown. Importantly though, the invoice for the external work to the Church roof and walls is due to be paid shortly and will therefore feature in the 2024 accounts. While the cost of $\pounds14,000$ (or $\pounds11,500$ after anticipated VAT recovery as the Church is a listed building) is in line with the initial estimate, it is fortunate that initial fears of much higher costs have proved to be unfounded.

The shortfall for 2023 has the effect of reducing the Church's reserves by £5,000. It also appears likely that the above property costs incurred this year will contribute to a further shortfall, and hence a further call on our reserves, when the 2024 accounts are available. It was also noted that the renewal terms for the Church of Scotland Energy Scheme will see a significant increase in electricity costs this year.

It therefore remains important that costs are carefully managed and income is maintained, or increased, where possible. The higher cost of living has increased the Church's costs generally, as it has for all of us, so please keep in mind whether you might be able to review your giving at this time. Gift Aid provides a valuable boost to the Church's income and taxpayers who have not already done so are encouraged to consider (Continued on page 6) completing a Gift Aid declaration in conjunction with giving by Standing Order or Free Will Offering envelopes – I will be happy to provide more details on request – contact details on page 11.
